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# How Residents Access the Pediatrics Self-Directed Assessment

## ABP Pre-Test Example

Residents take one of the ABP sub-topic exams or one of the Pediatrics Practice Board Exams as a pretest. All questions are mapped to the ABP topic areas. System enables residents to record notes, mark questions for later review, as well as highlight and strike out text to help them focus on key information. Residents receive scoring feedback at the end of the exam.

## Review Results

## ABP Post-Test

After residents have performed self-directed refresher/remediation based upon their exam results they will retake the exam again with all test questions jumbled into a new order. Once a minimum score is achieved (as determined by the institution) residents have completed the program and can receive a certificate of completion.
